The Library continued to thrive as a hub of activity from outdoor concerts to quiet study rooms, children's story times to virtual reality demonstrations. Circulation of both print and digital materials increased by more than 10%. Program attendance surpassed 25,000 for the second year in a row (over 37,000 when meetings and programs by local individuals and organizations are included) with patrons of all ages enjoying everything from local history lectures to coding clubs.

With our two neighboring public libraries both undergoing renovation projects, much of our focus this year was on meeting the increased demands for our core services. A 300-square-foot administrative office was repurposed as a flexible public space which hosted programs by the Ted-Ed Club, Girls Coach Girls Run, and the library's coding club just to name a few. This allowed us to host more technology classes than ever before while still keeping up with the public's demand for both meeting spaces and quiet study spaces. Other subtle but significant changes to the public space such as the addition of the sound proof "phone booth" upstairs, moving the holds shelf downstairs, or sound proofing the craft room, all aimed to improve the patron experience wherever possible.

Our ability to meet the public demand and continue to evolve is thanks to our many partnerships and supporters. While there are too many to list in this report we once again worked with local organizations such as the Guilford Keeping Society, the Schiller Shoreline Institute for Lifelong Learning, Shoreline Village CT and the Guilford Public Schools to present the widest variety of programming possible. Most importantly, the Friends of the Library continue to provide an extraordinary level of support, contributing \$95,000 to library operations last year after record breaking book sales.

We said goodbye to Nancy Wardell who played a crucial role as the Head of Circulation for over 25 years and welcomed generations of new library users. We also bid a fond farewell with gratitude to our outgoing board members Rob Currie and Mark Vail.

Children's Services

The summer reading game's theme this year was Libraries Rock. Children were encouraged to read about musicians, learn about music and its history, study geology, as well as attend events that tied in to the theme. The library was able to give away a free book to every child who signed up to play the summer reading game. The game included an online component, where children could create their own musician character that earned costumes and powers when children read and kept track of books. Children could also complete optional learning challenges both inside the library and out, such as the library scavenger hunt and visiting a museum. The summer programs were primarily funded by the Guilford Civic Women, whose support of the library's reading program has continued now for 28 years. Programs included: Kickoff with juggler Bryson Lang, Sing-Along with Ken, Drum & Dance, Science of Sound Finale, American Girl, Hartford Yard Goats, Butterfly Gardening, and more. 253 children reported reading 2,704 books, though total circulation of children's materials for the summer was 29,386.

The 2018-2019 year saw the continuation of several of last year's successful new initiatives, including: improved Nutmeg Book Club, Dog Days of Summer Movies, Comic Con, Toy Library, expanding the offerings of the Lana Ferguson Literary Festival, and expanding the library's native-plant butterfly garden. New initiatives included:

-CLA Presentation on the Toy Library: Angelina and Sara Bartelmo., along with school psychologist Sheryl Shyloski who was instrumental in developing the toy library, presented a panel at the Connecticut Library Association annual conference. -National Chemistry Week was celebrated with an all-ages hands-on science show. -Mutt-i-grees in the Library was a new programming initiative which uses curriculum developed by The Pet Savers Foundation, North Shore Animal League, and Yale University School of the 21st Century to teach compassion and community with the help of animals. This series had events for children, teens, and adults, and often programs encouraged intergenerational and community cooperation for the greater good.

-Shelf-care is something we exercised a lot this year with a variety of weeding and re-organizing projects: The entire juvenile fiction section was shifted to even out the books on the shelves and make for a cleaner, more inviting space while allowing room to grow. The entire non-fiction section was shifted as well, leaving an entire row of shelving clear on one side, which allowed us to move the series books onto this shelf and give that section a cleaner look and more room to expand. -Lana Ferguson Literary Festival was expanded this year to include two best-selling/award-winning authors, one for younger children and one for older children. We also continued what we started last year, which was hosting our middle-grade author at Baldwin middle school prior to having our after-school program with them at the library.

Monthly and annual programs were funded by the Friends of the Library throughout the year, including: animal shows, sensory storytime, musicians, science and maker tween programs, Make A Book, Tellabration!, Crazy 8s Math Clubs, various holiday Story & Crafts, Gingerbread House Workshop, Winter Magic Show, Preschool Sing-Along, Holiday Card Making, Take Your Child To The Library Day, Garden Club, Preschool Information Fair, and Teddy Bear Sleepover.

There were many individuals and organizations in Guilford that volunteered their services to the Children's Department and contributed their time, talents, and/or funds to keeping the room in good shape and making the programs a success. The Children's staff experienced change as we said goodbye to Sara Bartelmo who has done a great job as second in command. We wish her the best of luck in her future endeavors. She will be greatly missed. Library staff continue to provide excellent service to patrons through traditional library programming, new ideas, and everyday interactions.





Reference Services / Adult Programming

Meeting the demand for core library services in a proactive and thoughtful manner drives the work of Reference Services. Patrons want access to the latest books, interesting programming and opportunities to learn new skills.

In 2018-19, Reference Services launched several initiatives to get books into the hands of patrons faster. This year, the Library offered Overdrive Advantage—a service that gives exclusive access to bestselling e-books and e-audiobooks for Guilford patrons first. The popularity of digital reading continues to rise. This growing demand for e-books and e-audiobooks using the Overdrive digital catalog has led to longer wait times for our patrons. By investing in the Overdrive Advantage program, Guilford patrons are able cut the line for popular items in the digital catalog.

An upgrade to Quick Picks, the Library's collection of bestsellers, enabled us to offer more copies of the most popular books to patrons. Prior to this change, Quick Picks circulated for one week only with no option to renew. In response to a suggestion by Library Board President Bonnie Garmisa, the Library expanded the Quick Pick collection to offer books for a two-week loan period as well as increased the number of books offered in the collection. Circulation for Quick Picks increased 25% in just two months since the loan period change.

A new membership to OCLC, the Online Computer Library Center, allowed our staff to request books for Guilford Library patrons from across the country. Interlibrary Loan specialist Judy Haggarty uses OCLC to fulfill requests for more obscure titles at a reasonable cost. The library also uses the service to provide books for popular book discussion series, requesting 20+ copies for book discussions led by Mark Schenker or the Writing Injustice Series.

Adult Programming continues to be an important draw to the Library for patrons. Program topics covered a wide range of topics including Guilford history, the arts and the latest science news. Attendance in 2018-19 was strong with 9,685 patrons attending 716 programs. Highlights of the season included a visit from renowned author Andre Dubus III on the publication of his latest novel, Gone So Long. Dubus enthralled his audience with his quick wit and insights into the writing process. Booking an author of Dubus' caliber was made possible by the generous support of the Friends. Other highlights included two Sunday afternoon concerts by the world renowned classical ensemble. The Lions Gate Trio. Guilford patron Robert Jaeger brought the trio to the Library as a fundraising event in the fall. In the spring, the Trio returned with another inspiring performance. We look forward to future concerts by Lions Gate, now considered the Library's Trio in Residence.

Friends of the Guilford Free Library President's Report

The Friends, once again, had an incredible year, contributing to the library in every imaginable way. The Fall Book Sale, the Holiday Sale, the Spring Sale, online sales and our annual membership drive earned a record-breaking total of over \$100,000 for the library.

The Friends' support funded a host of programs for library patrons of all ages and paid for the majority of all books, equipment and technology purchases as well as digital subscriptions.

Technology – Friends funded a portable display screen that can transform any room in the library into a computer lab. The Friends added six laptops to further enhance this mobile computer lab that is now being used for a number of classes, the coding club and other groups. A new portable virtual reality headset and a new 3-D printer helped upgrade previously existing services funded by the Friends.

Equipment – Friends funded new tables and chairs for a recently created public space that had formerly been an administrative office. This newly designed space has hosted numerous groups including, Girls Who Code, Girls Coach Girls Run, the Ted-Ed Club and the Chess Club and has provided additional space for patrons on a daily basis. The Friends also paid for the "Room", a phone booth-like structure that allows patrons to make phone calls upstairs without disturbing the nearby quiet areas.

Programs – Friends funded an enormous array of programs for all ages – from story hours and magic shows to lectures by Yale scholars and noted authors on science, history, literature, music, art and more. In addition, the Friends funded several concerts throughout the year, most notably the popular "Music Under the Stars" outdoor summer concert series. This year the Friends paid for the library to expand its selection of museum passes to include out of state museums such as the Guggenheim and the Frick in New York.

Print and other media - Friends funded widely used streaming services that allow Guilford patrons to enjoy books, audiobooks, films, television and music from their own mobile devices. Friends continued to fund portable wireless hotspots that can be checked out by patrons and subscription databases such as Consumer Reports and Ancestry.com. All of these resources supplement well over 1,000 print books, newspapers and periodicals that are funded by the Friends.

Staff Development – Friends funded several opportunities for the enrichment of the library staff including Book Expo, the Maker Faire, the CLA Conference, the Connecticut Education Network Conference and Computer in Libraries.

These contributions continue to help make the Guilford free Library a vibrant and welcoming center for the social and cultural life of our community.

We'd like to thank all of our members for their ongoing, generous support. From our annual donors to those committed volunteers preparing for the book sales week in and week out, our success is truly a team effort. We'd also like to thank the library staff for their tireless support and cooperation in all that we do. Together our team has worked to achieve another outstanding year!

Teen Services

Teen Services focused on maintaining the diversity of programs that are offered to tweens and teens throughout the year, as well as expanding the focus beyond tweens and teens to young adults in their 20s. This year, Teen Services worked on obtaining unique resources for teens to access in the library, including various musical instruments, as well as hosting programs that use these resources. Off-site trivia nights and book clubs were implemented as community outreach programs in effort to reach the slightly older crowd of adults in their 20s who may not frequent the library. As in previous years, Teen Services helped plan Guilford Comic Con and collaborated with other town departments to plan programs for tweens and teens. Lastly, with the success of the Harry Potter themed summer reading game from last year, the teen department ran it again this year.

The Library purchased an electronic drum set, electric guitar, and electric bass guitar for teens and other patrons to use in-house. The electronic drum set was purchased in preparation for a drum lessons program that was taught for tweens and teens. While the instructor ended up bringing his own real drum set, we have had other programs that included the electronic drum set and other instruments such as Rockstar For A Day. Tweens and teens were invited to learn how to play the instruments and see what it's like to be in a rock band and play with other musicians.

The telescope owned by the Library was moved from being stored in the Children's Room to the Reference Department. To showcase the telescope and its abilities, Teen Services invited members of the Astronomical Society of New Haven to do two programs here at the Library. One was a stargazing night where patrons learned about meteors and the night sky and then got to view the moon outside in the Library's courtyard with the telescope. The other was specifically for tweens and teens to be able to view the sun through the telescope.

Community outreach via off-site programming has been a major focus of Teen Services this past year. To reach members of the community who don't often come to the Library, we collaborated with The Marketplace to host themed trivia nights there. The Library created the questions and hosted the game while The Marketplace hosted the space and offered food and drink to purchase. The trivia nights were geared towards adults in their 20s and 30s and had themes such as Harry Potter and general millennial trivia. Additionally, the teen librarian started a book club for adults who read young adult literature held off-site at KC's Pub. Book club members are welcome to purchase food and drink while the teen librarian leads the discussion of the books read.

Some programming highlights include the third annual Guilford Comic Con. The 2018 Con featured drawing classes, sword fighting demos, wizard rock performances, and more. Guilford High School student Ellie Wiesler led another year of TED Ed Club where tweens and teens chose a topic they were passionate about and developed their own TED Talks about them. Throughout the year, Teen Services also offered cooking classes, yoga, practice SAT and ACT exams, and a very successful Coding Club led by reference librarian Lisa Coady.

Teen Services aims to foster a love of literature, hone creativity and encourage the learning of technology in tweens and teens in the Guilford community. By offering a variety of different programs and books that appeal to a diverse audience, we hope to make sure that all teens feel invited and included. We strive for teens to find the Library to be a place that is welcoming, accepting, and supportive of all of their pursuits, whether they be academic, artistic, technological, or something in between.

Edith B. Nettleton Historical Room

July 1, 2018 - June 30, 2019

The Edith B. Nettleton Room is dedicated to collecting, preserving, and providing access to materials that focus on the unique culture and history of Guilford. Resources include photographs, oral histories, biography files, maps, books, directories, local newspaper clippings, and documents. The Edith B. Nettleton Historical Room is used on a daily basis for a variety of purposes such as genealogical research and as a hub for local historical organizations and scholars to conduct research. It is also often a designated quiet area which has been mostly unchanged in a generation providing a haven for those seeking a more traditional library experience. Due to the increasing demand for space it also provides a location for book discussions, poetry readings and children's programs.

The Library continued to offer popular programs focused on local history especially with the continuation of the Edith B. Nettleton Historical Lecture Series and collaborations with the Witness Stones Committee and The Guilford Keeping Society. The Edith B. Nettleton Digital Archive is under construction and a new and enlarged version will be launched early in 2020.

In December 2018, Tracy Tomaselli was hired to serve as the Edith B. Nettleton Historical Room Specialist. Having a dedicated staff member has allowed us to expand our already extensive services related to local history. Tracy handles patron inquiries pertaining to genealogy, property history, general town history, and other topics through email exchanges and in person. She also helps us maintain our active relations with local groups such as the The Guilford Keeping Society, the Guilford Preservation Alliance and the Henry Whitfield House. Tracy also held a beginners Ancestry tutorial class as part of the adult technology class offerings at the library. Tracy also assists with new acquisitions and helps at the reference desk when needed.

Adult Services / Technical Servies

The Library serves as a place of study, research, and exploration and enables discovery, creation and expansion of knowledge through services, instruction, collections, and programming.

In 2018-2019 the Friends of the Guilford Free Library generously funded the new Adult Museum Pass program, which provides Guilford patrons free admission to five New York City area museums and cultural destinations including The Frick Collection; Guggenheim; Intrepid Sea, Air & Space Complex; Museum of the City of New York; and New York Historical Society Museum and Library. Since its inception, the Adult Museum Pass Program has been extremely popular with our patrons.

In an ongoing effort to promote lifelong learning in the community, the Library increased its adult learning opportunities by offering more free adult classes than ever before. Class topics included; Using the Library from Home; Google Docs Basics; Microsoft Word Basics; Creating Strong Online Passwords; tips for using social cataloging sites such as Goodreads; Social Network (Facebook); Microsoft Excel Basics; How to Build your Family Tree with Ancestry; Google Search Terms; and Smartphone Photography. The Library also offered a series of classes on SketchUp; a powerful 3D design tool taught by Guilford native Emily Yale. Also a skilled craftsperson, Emily taught 4 Advanced Knitting and Crocheting classes for adults. The demand for our one-on-one technology assistance also grew with a record 352 patrons taking advantage of these "book-a-librarian" sessions.

Lastly, services for adult patrons continued to expand in 2018-2019. The Studio Space was active with 3D printing jobs, as well as patrons converting VHS to DVDs. New and updated equipment was also added to the space including; a new 3D printer, an additional virtual reality headset, and a portable smartboard screen for use with presentations and collaborative projects.

Our staff is dedicated to helping our patrons and providing the best library experience possible. We pride ourselves on offering innovative technologies as well as ample amounts of classes that provide patrons with plenty of opportunities for continued learning.
